
MAYAN HIEROGLYPHS

ON THE PAPER PROVIDED, DRAW THE HIEROGLYPHIC WORD AT THE RIGHT. NOTICE THAT IT IS MADE UP OF THE PARTS TO THE FAR RIGHT OF THIS CARD, CALLED "SYLLABLES."

EACH OF THE SYLLABLES CAN BE STRETCHED OR SQUISHED, AND MANY CAN BE ROTATED TO FIT THE AVAILABLE SPACE. THE MOST IMPORTANT THING IS TO MAINTAIN THE PROPER READING ORDER, AND TO LEAVE AS LITTLE **OPEN SPACE AS POSSIBLE WITHIN** A GLYPH BLOCK.

FOR THE ORDER, YOU START READING GLYPH BLOCKS AT THE TOP LEFT AND READ TO THE BOTTOM RIGHT.

GLYPH SYLLABLES



MAYAN HIEROGLYPHIC WRITING IS BASED ON SOUNDS. EACH GLYPH IMAGE REPRESENTS EITHER A VOWEL, A CONSONANT + VOWEL PAIR, OR AN ENTIRE WORD.

THE NAME FOR MONKEY IN ANCIENT MAYAN WAS BAATZ. TO WRITE THIS IN HIEROGLYPHS, YOU BREAK IT UP INTO **VOWELS OR CONSONANT+VOWEL PAIRS:**

BA - TZ(VOWEL).

IN THIS CASE, THE SECOND VOWEL IS DIFFERENT FROM THE PREVIOUS ONE, BUT IT WOULDN'T BE PRONOUNCED. **BA-TZU**

> 'what is your name?' bix a k'aaba tech bi-xi a k'a-ba te-che

'my name is '

in k'aaba i-ni k'a-ba


